Left Coast Crime: A Brief History

elcome to Portland! The 12th incarnation of The Western Regional Mystery Convention—whew!—it's been a long time coming. This year's committee has spent over a thousand hours of work to bring it to you, the membership, for which I am eternally grateful. To see something that I helped start over 13 years ago still going on as an institution is quite a sight.

You see, the first Left Coast Crime almost didn't happen.

The Left Coast Crime Convention was the brainchild of veterans of the San Francisco Bouchercon of 1985—Donna Rankin, Janet Rudolph, and I. It came from a shared belief that the West Coast needed a mystery gathering for fans every year, not just the years there was a western Bouchercon. Science fiction fans had regional conventions, why not mystery fans? So, the Western Regional Mystery Convention was launched—and sank without a trace in 1990.

The best laid plans of mice and mystery fans can come unglued. Don't panic, we told ourselves, just start again. We did, and with a new name: The Left Coast Crime Convention.


Back in those days an executive decision had been made that the person with the least amount of assets would be the chairman of the convention and sign the hotel contract. Signing a hotel contract for a new event such as Left Coast is not for the faint of heart; it was pledging your personal fortune. My mottos became, "No mortgage, no worries," along with, "You can't get blood from a stone," and the ever popular, "What, me worry?" I had chaired a Bouchercon at the same hotel—what could go wrong?

The Gulf War! Needless to say, attendance was off.

We needed 300 members to break even; 130 bought memberships in advance, 245 showed. As the event approached it became apparent that this was not going to be enough. There weren't even enough bodies to interest the hotel in






Laurie King

nce upon a time there was a young woman, born on the shores of San Francisco Bay, to a family that had come to California at the end

of the nineteenth century, looking for adventure and fortune. Her first eighteen years were lived under a curse from a wicked fairy godmother, dooming her never to go to the same school two years in a row. Isolated by this fiendish blight on her social life, Laurie made friends with books. This relationship turned out to be a lasting one. Books don't mind if you cut them off in mid-sentence or ignore them for weeks. What's more, when you're forced to move, they're happy to come along.

Human companions became more plentiful when Laurie entered the

University of California at Santa Cruz, but the books stayed close. She earned a BA in religious studies there and later, in a totally unconnected event, married her major professor, Noel King.

During the next few years she traveled the world, had two children, Zoe and Nathan, earned an MA in Old Testament Theology from the Graduate Theological

Union, and renovated a couple of houses.

It was during a sabbatical in Oxford in 1984 that she realized that she had five minutes with nothing to do and nothing to read. Naturally, she decided to write a book of her own. After writing one book from which, she says, "I learned how not to write," Mary Russell, aka *The Beekeeper's Apprentice*, appeared at her elbow and demanded to be part of her life. Laurie wasn't sure about dealing with Sherlock Holmes. She had read few of the stories and

not been terribly impressed. After tackling the complexity of tracing the development of the feminine in the Judeo-Christian image of God through several cultures and centuries, Holmes' deductions do seem rather elementary.



Steven Saylor

Sub Rosa series featuring Gordianus the Finder and set in the ancient Rome of Cicero and Caesar. The series so far: Roman Blood, The House of the Vestals (short stories), Arms of Nemesis, Catilina's Riddle, The Venus Throw, A Murder on the Appian Way,

Rubicon, Last Seen in Massilia, and the latest, due in May, A Mist of Prophecies.

Steven recently got back to his Texas roots by researching and writing his longest novel, *A Twist at the End*, featuring O. Henry and based on America's first recorded serial murders, which took place in Austin in 1885.

According to Ruth Rendell, "Saylor's scholarship is breathtaking and his writing enthralls." His books have been published in twelve languages: English, French, Dutch, German, Spanish, Czech, Russian, Finnish,

Norwegian, Portuguese, Polish and Greek. In recent years, book tours have taken him to many cities in the U.S. and the U.K., and to Berlin, Amsterdam and Lisbon.

In 1998, Steven appeared as an expert on Roman life in the Greystone documentary series *Rome: The Great*

Empire, shown internationally on The History Channel. In recent years he has spoken to numerous academic groups, including the American Classical League and the Junior Classical League (2000 high school students in togas and stolas!), as well as a gathering of Classics Department faculty and graduate students at his alma

mater, the University of Texas at Austin. The spring of 2002, Steven will have the honor of delivering the commencement address to the Classics Department and the Graduate Group in Ancient History and Mediterranean Archaeology at the University of California at Berkeley.

Years ago, as a beginning author, Steven's first-ever book tour appearance was in Portland, where he received a warm welcome from Friends of Mystery. He also received a stern warning about ever killing any cats in his books. He remembers both the welcome and the warning!

After twenty years of going back and forth, Steven still can't make up his mind between Austin and the San Francisco Bay area, but he can always be located at www.stevensaylor.com.

Don Herron according to Daddy Blue Bug, Esq.

on Herron, among many other things, is a chronicler of both words and events: Items he notes down in a little black book can later be toted out and used to refute one's recollections of a given situ-

ation or palaver, that one may have only minutely, and perhaps even unconsciously, embroidered to put oneself in a slightly better light than the famed harsh glare of reality would otherwise show. Most of the time, though, this chronicling of Don's is a good thing. Hell, it resulted in an extremely amusing and informative book-length appreciation of our mutual favorite writer and all-time hero, Charles Willeford, which I published in 1997. I have fond memories of

watching Don dig through boxes of papers in Willeford's garage in South Miami—literary archeology of the first water. Said chronicling also details Don's memories of a Tucson morning when I fixed everybody my famous eggs, grits, and salsa breakfast, and Don alone came down with food poisoning. I remember checking at the time, and sure enough, just *one* of the cardboard receptacles wherein had lain the eggs we'd eaten that morning had tell-tale sticky yellow goo, undoubtedly seething with *salmonella*, or worse. At least I didn't try to decapitate him, à la E. Hoffmann Price, also supposedly accidentally. (I don't even *own* a sword-cane.)

Just about mid-century, Don Herron uttered his first cries of anguish to the universe at large in a place called Detroit, Michigan, which most people have heard of. At the age of four, his parents moved back to Tennessee, to a place *nobody*, not even the people who live there, has

ever heard of: McMinnville. Don's cries of anguish turned into an outright cacophony of existential angst. How could it have been otherwise?

I've always imagined McMinnville, Tennessee, as being

akin to a smaller version of my own hometown, Wichita, Kansas, a place I early-on termed The Banality Capital of the World. These smug-assed towns, filled with people who've long ago decided just what life is all about and their exact place and function in the greater scheme of things, are good breeding grounds for immobilized writers and other artists who are forced to live primarily inside their own heads, since there just aren't any "real" people around

for them to interact with on a daily basis. Don did what any disgruntled and stultified person of intelligence and imagination would do in such a place—he got the hell out of there as soon as he could!

Don settled on San Francisco, moving there from McMinnville in 1974. But then, his interest in weird fiction and some of its surviving scribes—specifically the Wandrei brothers, Donald and Howard—convinced him to move to St. Paul, Minnesota, where he stayed for a year and a half until a second hellish winter was just about upon the town, whence he returned to San Francisco, where he has been ever since. He started the Dashiell Hammett walking tour in 1977, edited books for sf & fantasy genre publisher Underwood/Miller, and wrote his own books, mainly of criticism. (He thinks his City Lights guidebook, *The Literary World of San Francisco*,

I have encountered in my day, I put Dennis McMillan—alias D.R. McNuttlemeister, F.R.S., Publisher-Manqué & Aspiring Mendicant—a.k.a. D.B. Bug, Esq., Publicatus Mendicatum Rex—very near the top. For reference, I have met everyone from Police

Chiefs to Porn Queens and many a grand eccentric. Hey, I was almost beheaded by accident—it would have been an accident—by a blade whipped from his sword cane by the pulp great E. Hoffmann Price. For that reason alone I put Ed Price just a notch or two higher on my list than I place Dennis, who only poisoned me (another accident, no doubt).


Dennis' legend, all solidly based in fact, rolls out before him like

a dust storm off the desert. Do you remember back when he was publishing his first set of books—McMillan: Opus One? About every eight months he moved from one side of the country to another. No one has ever understood that. You collect this impressive series of books, including reprints of extremely rare Arthur W. Upfield and limited first editions of Charles Willeford and the crown jewels of the run, nearly twenty volumes in the Fredric Brown in the Pulps set. Are they all issued from New York? No. Are they all issued from the same place? No. You've got San Francisco and Miami Beach. Missoula, Montana and Volcano, Hawaii. Maybe one or two places no one has ever heard of....

Wandering about, his stories and thus his legend spread across the country. The time the two guys each had a gun to either side of his head. Stopping with booksellers in L.A., his scrofulous old dog knocks up their dog. So many outrageous—or, as Dennis would say, *rude*—tales. I guess my favorite is when he was back on his native turf, Wichita, before he set out to conquer the world. Both he and another guy were in hot pursuit of this one woman, bent on marriage. Dennis lost, and headed off on his

existential quest, which continues to this day. His rival married the woman, but filed for divorce about a week later after she tried to run him down with her car.

Dennis is like the High King of the Hipster Nation. Spends more time seeking out vintage clothing than he does looking for rare books. He's turned me on to sources for never-before-worn shoes from the 1940s, and bought me a snazzy jacket to apologize for poisoning



Last fall I was on the phone doing an interview with James Crumley, when he said that Dennis was just then pulling into the driveway, bearing deluxe copies from his edition of *The Final Country*. Crumley reported that Dennis was getting out of the car. Crumley stopped talking. Finally he said, "Look at that.... He's dressed just like a little Kewpie Doll!"

And then there are the gigantic old cars. The classic image: We were in Miami, and had liberated Donald Westlake from the local publicist for a few hours. It was almost time for Westlake to get back for a function and Dennis piled him into some monstrous Cadillac, longer than a bus. The starter didn't turn. Dennis jumped from behind the wheel, lifted the massive hood and started fiddling around with stuff. Westlake looked over at the rest of us where we were waiting as backup in a real car, grinned,

G. M. Ford an Appreciation

first met G.M. Ford seven years ago, shortly after I moved to Seattle, Jerry's home town. He had

just published his first book, Who in Hell Is Wanda Fuca?, and we met at a book signing, or in a library, or a coffee shop, or possibly a bar, or another one of those places where writers gather to talk about why advances are so small and how the hell did she get a 20-city tour? Jerry seemed to be a nice guy, free with his advice on where to shop and where to hang out on Russian Hill, and I liked him. I was delighted to give him the benefit of my years of writing experience: old pro at the writing game to fledgling scrivener. Anyone who knows me will tell you that I'm always glad to give other people advice. But he didn't seem to need my suggestions. Despite his neophyte status, he was already tossing around phrases like "the writing game," as well as more esoteric expressions like, "book tour," and "sub rights," and "joint

accounting," and "movie sale," and "six-figure advance," and "hard-soft deal."

"Who in Hell," I said to myself, "is this G. M. Ford?"

I'd been writing for a couple of decades by then, and I figured I'd paid my dues. But Ford? An uppity English teacher who'd had the luck to get his first novel published.

And then I sat down and read *Wanda Fuca*. Straight through. I laughed. I cried. I kept turning the pages until

the book was finished. What the hell; here was a man who didn't need advice on writing from anyone. Here was a pro, even if this was his first book. I wanted more.

And I was not alone. Mr. Ford's maiden (you should excuse the expression) effort in the field of detective novel writing was nominated for an Anthony, the award presented by the Bouchercon World Mystery Convention and named for the late Tony Boucher, the legendary critic and novelist. It was also nominated for the Shamus award for excellent writing by the Private Eye Writers of America, and for the Dilys award. Given by the Independent Mystery Booksellers' Association, the Dilys recognizes those books that were the most fun to sell.

Happily for those who fell under the blearily mystical spell of *Wanda Fuca*, Ford has supplied us with

further exploits of Leo Waterman, a rugged individualist who doesn't expect the world to live up to his standards and is seldom disappointed, and his Skid Row Irregulars band of homeless drunks. Their adventures were continued in *Cast in Stone* (1996), *The Bum's Rush* (1997), *Slow Burn* (1998), *Last Ditch* (1999), and The *Deader the Better* (2000), all of which subsequently came out in

you. With such a wonderful range of program participants and the talents they're sharing with us, we hope we've done them justice. We are deeply grateful and thank them for the gift of their time.

reprinted several times in updated editions, is his magnum opus, but the above-mentioned Willeford edges it out in my opinion.) He's also written a few short stories of the criminous and weirdly fantastic variety.

Don also has organized various literary conventions and get-togethers over the years, and drives a cab by night in order to have the time to do what he wants-which is to read good books and proselytize for writers who really have something to say and know how to say it in an artful way.

I first met Don through our mutual friend, Tim Underwood, when I moved to San Francisco in 1982. Tim pointed out that we only lived a couple of blocks from each other and liked the same kinds of books. (This was just as I was making up my mind to try publishing, with an eye toward doing something similar in the mystery field to what Tim and his partner, Chuck Miller, had been doing in the sf and fantasy fields since 1976.) Actually, I was fairly ignorant of most hard-boiled literature at that time, having read mostly science fiction until about the age of 30, but Don turned me on to a lot of writers, some of whom I later published!

We hit it off pretty well, although he got mad once early in our friendship when I laughed at a picture he showed me of him standing over Robert E. Howard's grave. It was the kind of laughter that forces itself out when you're in a situation where a response is expected, but you just have no idea what that expected response is supposed to be! (Don likes Robert E. Howard, and even edited a critical collection devoted to his writing, The Dark Barbarian, which, Don tells me, in its new trade paperback reprint, is his best-selling title on Amazon.com, beating out "my" Willeford.) He forgave me for it, though...I think. (I'm checking my eggs every morning while I'm here in Portland for a light dusting of salmonella, however.)

I give you Don Herron: raconteur, critic (presently reading and reviewing almost one mystery per week for Publisher's Weekly), gourmand, gastronome, auteur & author, guide (with pith-helmet and pithy commentary) to literary artifacts and artificers, both ancient and modern, an all-around bookman and littérateur...a good friend and capital fellowe!

leaned out the window and began writing on the dust on the door, H-E-L-P, I A-M B-E-I-N-G H-E-L-D....

I can say I have been on the Dennis-as-publisher scene from Upfield's *The House of Cain* in 1983. One thou-

sand copies. Man, did we ever try to talk him out of doing that many copies of a first book. No luck. Excellent as it is, that book dogged Dennis, boxes moved back and forth across the world. I remember shipping Dennis several boxes he'd left behind of his second title, the off-trail, non-noir *The Brazilian Guitar*—now incredibly rare and very costly, sought by collectors trying to complete their McMillan shelves. I could retire if I'd kept

a box of those. Even *The House of Cain*, which Dennis says, "I couldn't sell for \$30 up to a few years ago," lately has been priced at \$650 a copy by some dealers.

Between his first set of books from 1983 — 1991 and the current McMillan: Opus Two, which began in 1995, Dennis went off into the clothing market with his own brand of Hawaiian and Western shirts. The Fredric Brown set was done, Willeford had died, Crumley wasn't writing much. Dennis didn't know "if I could sell enough books to actually make a living, without the underpinning of something like the Fredric Brown series that I could rely on, whilst sprinkling other gems in amongst those tomes, as I discovered them or as they were written." So

he got into shirts and almost lost his, arriving in China (yes, China) just as the manufacturer was about to sell his entire inventory to someone else who had just shown up, liked the product, and offered a nickel more per item.

A difference of mere dollars, and Dennis could have been wiped out.

Today, among other titles, Dennis is releasing deluxe editions of Crumley (back in the saddle and riding like the wind), George P. Pelecanos and Michael Connelly—books which sell out before they are even printed. No doubt the high point of the new series of books has to be his 1996 edition of Kent Anderson's *Night Dogs*, a novel that had been rejected by

everybody. Dennis followed his instinct (and his books are hotly collectible because of this instinct) and published it. His run sold out in about a week and the bigtime publishers back in New York got into a *bidding war* to bring out a trade hardcover.

I'd say Dennis has *definitive* tastes for the fiction he calls rude. You know, a flat stretch of highway. The lonely diner rank with the smell of rancid vinyl. Tongue scorched by bad coffee. A .38 cool against the skin under your belt. Nowhere to go. Not a thing to lose. We all get that feeling, right? No publisher on earth is better than Dennis at scratching that itch.

But Mary persisted. The story wasn't about Holmes; it was about her, a New Woman of the twentieth century, facing one of the major symbols of the nineteenth. Laurie gave in and wrote the book in just a few weeks. As she said in a 1997 interview, "What other turning point could you think of when the old and the new meet so dramatically, and the male and the female face off?"

And this is where I enter the story, albeit on the fringes. During 1994 when the two of us were attending our first mystery conventions, we met. As is common at conventions, we had only a short while to chat, but I happened to mention that I tried to plan my itineraries in Europe not by what I wanted to see but by who I knew with a washing machine. I forgot all about it. Laurie didn't. Before leaving for the Nottingham Bouchercon I received a letter from Laurie, again in Oxford, offering her house for the night and, *mirabile dictu!*, the use of her washer. I took her up on both. I already knew she was a brilliant scholar and writer. That was when I learned that she is also a thoughtful and generous friend.

Since then, Laurie King has won many more awards, published a total of six Mary Russell books and four Kate Martinelli (her contemporary San Francisco detective character) novels, as well as two stand-alones, *A Darker Place* and *Folly*. She has also written short stories and had the unenviable challenge of writing the last chap-

ter of the recent collaborative novel *Naked Came the Phoenix*. Her books are translated into almost as many languages as she reads and have sold nearly two million copies.

Avon paperbacks. Jerry was nominated once again for an Anthony by the 1997 Bouchercon for *The Bum's Rush*.

Ford was born in Everett, Massachusetts, 57 years ago. Obeying John Babsone Lane Soule's 1851 injunction to "Go west, young man," he moved out to Oregon, where he taught English at Rogue Community College in Grants Pass for 14 years. Then he moved to Seattle and decided to try the trade and write a mystery novel. He likes to joke that: "Inside every English teacher, there's a novel—which is exactly where it should stay." It's a joke that he should stop telling because he is living proof that inside at least one English teacher there lurked a series of novels that came out with a flourish, to well-deserved rave reviews, and an appreciative

A small digression: if you want to learn how he did it, perhaps with the idea of trying it yourself, I suggest you move to Seattle, where Jerry teaches a class in Mystery and Suspense Writing at the University of Washington, when he isn't out sailing on Lake Washington or writing his next novel. However I should point out that one of the things you'll learn is that, as Ford

himself puts it, mystery writing is "a damn tough way to make a buck." I don't know any mystery writers, including the most successful ones, who would disagree. When Raymond Chandler was once asked how he writes, he replied that every morning he put a fresh sheet of paper into his typewriter (remember typewriters?), and then stared at it until the blood formed on his forehead.

But it could be said that we suffer for your delight, and that delight more than repays us for the suffering. If so, G.M. Ford must suffer more than most. If you've never had the pleasure of reading any of Jerry's *oeuvre* (that's French for "stuff"), let me place him for you in the pantheon of mystery writers. He has the sensibility and pacing of John D. Macdonald, with a touch of Ross Macdonald. His dead-pan humor puts him squarely between Don Westlake and Carl Hiaasen. His sense of place ranks with that of Sara Paretsky, and his ability to handle dialog is right up there with Elmore Leonard's.

Fulsome praise? Perhaps. But, darn it, I think those other authors deserve it—they're that good. If you're

wondering why I didn't include, say, Shakespeare and Chaucer in my accolade, well, Shakespeare wrote plays and sonnets, and it's hard to make a comparison; and I find Chaucer's prose a little dated, don't you?

And, just to disabuse us of the notion that he had but one book—or one series—in him, Ford has begun a brand new series, with a brand new lead character. Frank Corso is the character's name. As *Publishers Weekly* puts it—because by now you've probably decided that

I'm biased in favor of Ford's writing—"Frank Corso, a renegade journalist with a conscience and a penchant for solitude, makes a winning debut in this new series from the author of the Leo Waterman novels."

The name of the book is *Fury*, and it's a winner indeed. Writing is truly a damn tough way to make a buck, but we can all be thankful that G.M. Ford decided to tough it out.
