

GUEST OF HONOR – DENNIS LYNDS

Welcome to the large and exciting literary world of Dennis Lynds. Over some five decades, he's published more than 80 novels and won many mystery and literary awards, both nationally and internationally, including the Edgar, awarded by the Mystery Writers of America, the Marlowe Lifetime Achievement Award from MWA, SoCal Chapter, and the Eye Lifetime Achievement Award of the Private Eye Writers of America.

Under the pen name Michael Collins, his Dan Fortune stories constitute one of the longest-running private detective series ever written, covering nearly four decades beginning in 1967 with Act of Fear and continuing on with publishing contracts into the year 2005.

To learn more about his work and where it fits into the panoply of books published each year, let's start with his most popular pseudonym, Michael Collins, and the detective that "Collins" created — Dan Fortune.

Collins is largely credited with being the writer who brought the detective novel into the modern age: "Many critics believe Dan Fortune to be the culmination of a maturing process that transformed the private eye from the naturalistic Spade (Dashiell Hammett) through the romantic Marlowe (Raymond Chandler) and the psychological Archer (Ross Macdonald) to the sociological Fortune (Michael Collins)," according to Private Eyes: 101 Knights by Robert Baker and Michael Nietzel.

Baker and Nietzel point out a popular phenomenon that began with Collins's first book: the by-now monotonous chant by critics about each new hard-boiled author being 'the successor to Hammett,' 'the new Chandler,' and 'the heir to Ross Macdonald.'" John Conquest, in Trouble Is Their Business, says of this critical mantra, "But the only realistic way to look at this is to identify those writers who have clearly redefined the genre as Hammett, Chandler and Macdonald did. To the qualities of naturalism, romanticism and psychology with which, respectively, they moved the genre forward . . . can be added at least two other major contributions; Michael Collins (Dennis Lynds) made his books vehicles for sociological observation, while James Crumley introduced empathy and poetry."

"After naming Lynds the Best Suspense writer of the 1970s," Baker and Nietzel continue, "the Crime Literature Association of West Germany praised him as follows: 'The break in private eye novels started with Michael Collins. At the end of the 1960s, he gave it something new, a human touch needed for years. The

novels are much more than entertainment. There is a philosophy behind the detective, and in each book we take a look at a special section of American society.'

Explaining that he had more ideas than he knew what to do with, and stories that did not fit Dan Fortune, he created additional series under the pseudonyms Mark Sadler, John Crowe, William Arden, and Carl Dekker, all of which you can read about on this website. For a few years, he published under three of these pseudonyms at the same time at three different publishing houses — Dodd-Mead, Random House, and Bobbs-Merrill. For many years, the New York Times listed his books annually as among the nation's top mysteries. One year, two appeared, listed under two of his pseudonyms.

As he was writing detective novels, he also published literary books and short stories. Four of his short stories were honored in Best American Short Stories. He was twice short-listed for the Drue Heinz Literature Prize for short stories. Altogether, he's written more than 200 short stories, and his mystery and

detective short stories have appeared in Best Crime & Mystery Stories of the Year many times. Twice he's been the guest of honor at literary festivals in France honoring the American detective novel.

Among his other contributions to the suspense field that show his wide and interesting creative range are thirteen juvenile mysteries under the name William Arden as well as eight "The Shadow" novels.







In the late 1980s and into the 1990s, Lynds's work took another turn. He began lacing his detective novels with short stories, biographies, and symbolic vignettes expanding the theme and characters of each novel, a technique that recent mystery writers have copied.

Critic Richard C. Carpenter discussed these literary innovations in Twentieth Century Crime and Mystery Writers: "The style is more varied, more often breathless and jagged, using italic passages to change tone.... Powerful and memorable, [these new techniques] indicate that Collins has embarked on a new course after

some 80 books. Truly he is a writer to be reckoned with."

There are now 20 Dan Fortune books, the most recent being FORTUNE'S WORLD, published in August 2000. Since then he has published eight short stories in EQMM and various anthologies, the most recent appearing in the anthology MURDER IN VEGAS in March 2005. Also in 2002, a collection of non-Fortune short stories — "Spies and Thieves", "Cops and Killers", Etc. — was published.

Readers can look forward to other new works: Lynds's latest literary novel, PICTURES ON A BED-ROOM WALL, is with his agent now, he has completed a thriller, THE CEO, and he is writing his nineteenth Dan Fortune novel as well as a new literary novel. A collection of short stories featuring Slot-Machine Kelly, the precursor to Dan Fortune, is scheduled to be published in June.

In Ellery Queen magazine, critic Jon Breen has written that Lynds is "a master of crime fiction." In the Los Angeles Times, when critic Dick Lochte reviewed the recent Fortune's World, he commented:

"To spin tales as intriguing and thought provoking as these for three decades is a remarkable enough achievement. Even more remarkable is the sustained quality.... In 'Family Values' . . . Fortune not only uncovers a tricky murder motive while calling attention to a heinous criminal practice, but he also manages to offend both sides in one of today's most controversial topics. It takes style to bring that off. Bravery, too, of course."




New York Times bestseller Gayle Lynds is the award-winning author of eight international espionage novels, including THE LAST SPYMASTER, THE COIL, MASQUERADE, and MESMERIZED, which are published in some 20 countries. Her books have won such awards as "Novel of the Year" (THE LAST SPYMASTER) given by the Military Writers Society of America, and have been People magazine *Page-Turner of the Week* and *Beach Read of the Week*.

Publishers Weekly lists her work among the top ten spy novels of all time. BookPage concurs: "Gayle Lynds has joined the deified ranks of spy thriller authors like Robert Ludlum and John le Carre." With Ludlum, she created the Covert-One se-

ries and wrote three of the novels. One of them, THE HADES FACTOR, was a CBS miniseries in April 2006.



"I got the opportunity to work with Dennis briefly when he submitted a story to the IACW (International Association of Crime Writers) anthology MURDER IN VEGAS. Though I had known Dennis for a long time, it was the first and only time we worked together. Supposedly. The reality was that we really didn't work together because Dennis' story needed no editing or help from me. He submitted a story that was good to go. He was the classic professional all the way. What's more is that he was so selfless. From the early stages of my career we crossed paths in Southern California on numerous occasions and Dennis, the familiar figure in the cowboy hat, was always quick with the supportive word, the feedback on the latest book or the suggestion born of his long experience. No doubt that as a writer Dennis Lynds gave much more than he ever took. And that makes him an example for all of us to follow."

Remembering Dennis Lynds by Gary Phillips

I write this on a day when after returning from a memorial for two fallen young people. One was the daughter of a friend I've known for some decades, connected as we are by our politics and community activist experiences. These days she's an assemblywoman in the California state legislature, taking the struggle to make change into that arena. Her 23-year-old daughter and son-in-law were unexpectedly taken from this world in a car accident. At the service were a lot of old comrades and a few foes.

This sense of loss provides a frame of reference to record this remembrance of Dennis Lynds. I first met Dennis, as many of us did, through his writing. He was, as they say, prolific. He ghosted Mike Shayne mysteries, Nick Carters, Charlie Chans, Mack Bolan the Executioner (with Gayle as co-writer on some of them I believe) installments, wrote as a homage to his friend Ross Macdonald, a series dealing with class and race issues set in a Santa Barbara stand-in called Buena Costa County as John Crowe, and even a few Shadow revival novels under the house name of Maxwell Grant. In particular it was THE SHADOW: DESTINATION MOON, that introduced us.

Set in the then Cold War era of the late '60s, the Shadow with his agents Margo Lane and Harry Vincent, investigate whose been sabotaging NASA rocket launches. It could be the Soviets, the Red Chinese, but no, it was the organization of mercenary fascist nihilists, CYPHER, out to own the moon for themselves. Perfect. The Shadow as the people's avenger. Dennis even had a villain in the book named Max Ernest, a riff on Max Ernst, the surrealist artist influenced by the turmoil of '30s Germany. That was Dennis.

His best-known creation is Dan Fortune, a one-armed private eye who many feel opened the door to the modern introspective investigator involved in cases that dealt with social and political themes. It couldn't be otherwise given that the name he wrote the Fortune books under was Michael Collins, taken from the Irish revolutionary leader.

"You think because you have one arm I won't fight you?"

"You wouldn't like my way of fighting."

"What the shit does that mean?"

"It means no rules, no sporting chances. Only a damn fool puts the fight above what he fights for."

If he would see that as a challenge, confession or threat, I never found out.

This passage is from CASTRATO, a Fortune story about personal destruction and sexual politics, with a subtext that deconstructs the western myth. The book at times shifts from first to third person to biographical asides in the course of the story. This experimentation in style and structure, as Richard Carpenter observed in an essay about Michael Collins' work, had Dennis bringing something new to the hardboiled school.

And who but Dennis could be awarded the Bronze Star among other medals for bravery in World War II and years later receive an Edgar as well? His novel COMBAT SOLDIER demonstrated the worlds he straddled as infantryman and writer.

"His rifle lay in the snow at his feet. There was blood on the bayonet. He did not remember using the bayonet, not since early yesterday. Yesterday that seemed as far away and as distant from him as the bleak fields themselves, silent under the darkening sky. It had been yesterday, and he had wiped the bayonet clean."

What emerges for me about Dennis, besides "being smart, funny and insightful, and our connection through our politics, is that he got the job done. The craftsman who didn't half-ass the work, be it an escapist Nick Carter or his more personal and developed Fortune books that still resonate. I sure miss him, even though he took my money at the poker table. But we have his books, and that's no small thing.

Present at the Creation?

I first met Gayle and Dennis Lynds at the 2002 Edgars, when I was privileged, as an unpublished author, to sit on a panel on spy thrillers with Gayle, Francine Mathews, and the late Walter Wager. I'd read at least one espionage novel by each of these masters in order to prepare. Since it was my first panel, and in New York, and, my God, the Edgars, I was understandably nervous. I needn't have worried. Gayle put me at ease and made me look good. Afterwards, she and I, Dennis and my wife Julie walked the few blocks to the traditional agents and editors reception. During the walk and at the reception, I spoke with Gayle and Dennis about their idea that while thrillers were honored along with mysteries at the Edgars and in other award foray, the genre deserved to have its own annual awards. I was writing historical mysteries and had no intention of writing spy thrillers myself, despite my 30 years at the CIA. Two years after that conversation, Gayle found a kindred spirit and a tireless, dedicated compatriot in David Morrell at the 2004 Bouchercon. She and David went on to form the International Thriller Writers and not only found a way to make annual awards in that category, but have set in motion what will be a series of conferences to bring those writers and readers together, first in Phoenix, and in 2007 in New York City.

On that cool April evening walk in New York, I heard at least as much passion for the genre from Dennis as I did from Gayle. His own body of work contained the mysteries he's best known for, but also many thrillers of which he was very proud. All I did was provide a sounding board for their ideas. But since then, I've vetted a couple of manuscripts for Gayle and a handful of other spy thriller writers and she became my mentor when I attempted a Civil War spy novel. I've kept every page she marked and may some day speak on the writing and revision process. Gayle and Dennis gave generously of their time to an entire generation of writers and deserve the admiration and respect of authors and readers in every genre.

GUEST OF HONOR APPRECIATIONS Gayle Lynds

This year, Left Coast Crime is proud to have internationally best-selling author Gayle Lynds as an honored guest. She is the award-winning author of numerous espionage novels. Two of the many elements that set her spy novels apart are the experience she gained from having a security clearance at a national affairs "think tank" and the passion with which she researches every detail of her novels. Her depictions of tradecraft and the mindset of an operative are impeccably accurate.

Gayle's high standards recently prompted *Publishers Weekly* to put her ground-breaking 1996 novel MAS-QUERADE on a list of the top fifteen spy novels of all time, a list that includes John le Carre's THE SPY WHO CAME IN FROM THE COLD and Frederick Forsyth's THE DAY OF THE JACKAL. Gayle's other novels include MESMERIZED, THE COIL, and THE LAST SPYMASTER, an aptly titled dramatization of how espionage agencies have changed and sometimes gone into crisis since the fall of the Soviet Union and the end of the Cold War.

Gayle's suspenseful novels feature strong female characters in a type of novel typically dominated by male characters. These days, it's not unusual for women to write about spies, or for male spy authors to write leading female characters, but when Gayle wrote MASQUERADE, she was truly a pioneer in what might be called an old boy's network.

She is an example for other female spy authors and indeed prepared the way for many of them. In that context, it is particularly significant that the Military Society Writers of America gave THE LAST SPYMASTER its award for the 2006 Novel of the Year. To quote Booklist, "Gayle Lynds has joined the deified ranks of spy thriller authors like Robert Ludlum and John le Carre."

At the same time, while other spy novelists were still writing about the Cold War, she was among the first to write about the contemporary world and keep the form alive until 9/11 reawakened the country's interest in global affairs and intelligence.

Besides her own books, Gayle co-created the Covert One series with Robert Ludlum and authored three of its novels: THE PARIS OPTION, THE ALTMAN CODE, and THE HADES FACTOR. The latter was filmed as an exciting CBS miniseries in 2006.

Gayle has also contributed to thriller writing in yet another way. In 2004, she co-founded the International Thriller Writers organization, which is dedicated to raising reader awareness about thrillers and helping its members achieve the recognition they deserve. In a few short years, it has grown to include over 500 thriller authors whose worldwide book sales total nearly two billion copies.

I too was a co-founder of ITW, and I couldn't have asked for a wiser, more enthusiastic and knowledgeable partner. Gayle is a joy to work with--a teacher and a diplomat as well as a novelist. Generous with her talent, her time, and her counsel, she has made a difference for many people.

Gayle Lynds was my first friend in the mystery/thriller genre. We met (via email) back in July 2000, shortly after I started writing book reviews. This was years before I ever dreamed of being a newspaper critic. At that point, I was only posting my reviews on Amazon. One of the books I wrote about was Gayle Lynds' THE HADES FACTOR, the first Covert-One novel she co-wrote with Robert Ludlum.

I enjoyed the book a lot and said so in my review. To my surprise and delight, a week or so later I received an email from Gayle, thanking me for the kind words I'd written. I didn't really know who Gayle Lynds was I had read the book because it had Ludlum's name on it – but I was blown away that an actual author had taken the time to write to me. It was the first time that had ever happened.

We started a correspondence then, exchanging emails back and forth, and eventually Gayle was the subject of the first author interview I ever did. We finally met in person in 2003 at Bouchercon in Las Vegas. Sitting by the pool, she gave me a master class in thriller novels and



that not only helped improve my abilities as a critic, but helped to inspire my own novel.

The contributions that Gayle Lynds has made to the thriller genre are huge. Not only has she written bestselling novels that have delighted millions of readers, she helped to co-found International Thriller Writers (along with David Morrell), an organization dedicated to bringing well-deserved attention and respect to the genre.

But Gayle Lynds has also had a very personal impact on both the genre and its writers. By teaching courses on writing, offering blurbs, reading manuscripts, and mentoring up-and-coming authors, she has played a key role in making the world of thrillers as rich and vibrant as it is today.

We all know what a fine writer Gayle Lynds is. The books she's written and the success she has earned are more than enough to win her every accolade in the business. But it is for her kindness and generosity of spirit, her dedication to improving the state of the genre and the writing in it, that Gayle most merits acknowledgment. I can't think of anyone who deserves being a Guest of Honor more.

THEY MAKE THIS BUCKEYE PROUD

Two Ohio librarians have enhanced this Ohio librarian's life in ways I would have though impossible a mere decade ago.

Diane, with other librarians, decided in 1991 that it would be great to have a listserve for mystery fans. Diane quickly recruited another Kent State librarian as co-owner and moderator of the list named in honor of Dorothy L. Sayers. Kara has become a wife, mother and lawyer. Diane has her own consulting and training business and writes books and presents programs for researchers and others on using the Internet to find reliable information.

DorothyL averages about 3000 members, but with new people coming and others dropping out there seems little doubt that thousands of mystery fans have at one time or another been members of DorothyL. There are other Internet groups that discuss and love mysteries, but it seems that DorothyL is the best known and long-est-lived of such cyberspace gatherings. But few of us really know Diane and Kara. I have met Diane twice at library events and am looking forward to meeting Kara in Seattle.

My tribute, therefore, must consist of praising the fruits of Diane's and Kara's efforts. I'm sure my story is not much different from the many other fans who have been a part of DorothyL.

Which one of us doesn't remember getting our first e-mail from an author about a review we did a book we reviewed on DL? "OMG, I got an email from 'famous mystery author' and really can't believe it." And how many of us would never have gone to a mystery convention without the encouragement and glowing reports of such events on DorothyL?

Since I joined DL, about 1996, I have heard the term "mystery community" many times. I think within this community, DorothyL is more of a "family" albeit often a dysfunctional one.

HOMAGE TO GARY

I completed the early drafts of my first mystery novel while I was working as a newspaperwoman at a small Japanese American community daily located next to Los Angeles' Skid Row. Was it possible for someone like me to get a mystery book published? And not any kind of mystery, but a mystery that dealt intimately with issues of class and race, taking place in Southern California neighborhoods called Crenshaw, Gardena and Altadena.

Well, Gary Phillips told me it could get done. Not personally at first, but through his debut mystery, VIOLENT SPRING. The original book jacket is as powerful and raw as the story, which takes place during the aftermath of the Los Angeles riots. In it, Gary wrote about what he knew and what he didn't know but could imagine. He was a risk taker and continues to be a risk taker.

We all know of the Bouchercon and other convention stories, of Gary's booming laugh, imposing figure (although it's been whittled down a bit) and basketball skills (or should I say non-skills). I myself was a victim of Gary's roundball prowess when he knocked me down but I safely landed on his belly.

We know of his willingness to jump into different forms -- comic books, graphic novels, short stories - and different POVs. We know of his razor-sharp dialogue, popping and energetic, unforgettable characters and his fast-moving plot lines.

But in this small town called Los Angeles, I've also witnessed different sides of Gary, who is also a comic-book geek and organizational genius. Like his firecracker wife, Gilda Haas, he has fought for fair housing for the poor and working class. But the thing about Gary is that his style is not didactic or strident. But almost deceptively easy going, sly and may I say good-humored. All people deserve a place to live, yeah, it's a given. So how do we make this happen?

In the same way, Gary has entered the ring of the mystery world. He has sustained some hard punches in his career, like most of us writers have. But he gets up and thinks of new ways to keep fighting. Because there's no other choice.

Some writers will remain perpetual observers, almost afraid to get involved in politics or social causes because it might tarnish their outsider's point of view. In the minority are authors like Gary who are unafraid of getting dirty in the muck of life, yet still able to retain their creative minds and hearts and also have some fun in the process. Thank God for the minority.



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Gone, But Not Forgotten

As mystery's unofficial "obituarian," I take this opportunity to help Left Coast Crime attendees remember people important to the mystery genre who died in 2006.

M(ARY) J(O) ADAMSON at age 71, in October 2006. She wrote two detective series, one about Balthazar Marten and Sixto Cardenas and the other about an 1840s Boston reporter Michael Merrick.

ROBERT ALTMAN at age 81, on November 20, 2006. The innovative film director of *M*A*S*H* fame directed two episodes of *Alfred Hitchcock Presents* in 1957-1958.

PETER BENCHLEY at age 65, on February 12, 2006. The author of JAWS (1974), enormously popular as a book and a movie, he also wrote several crime novels.

HERBERT BURKHOLTZ at age 73, on April 30, 2006. He wrote spy novels and thrillers, including three with the literary hoaxer Clifford Irving.

ALAN CAILLOU at age c.92, on October 1, 2006. The prolific author of thrillers wrote many books, including the "Assault" series featuring series character Cabot Cain.

PETER CHAMBERS at age 81, on July17, 2006. He wrote under the pseudonyms "Simon Challis," "Peter Chester," and "Philip Daniels," and as Chambers was author of the Mark Preston, private eye, series.

ANTHEA COHEN at age c.92, in January 2006. The British novelist was author of at least nine mysteries about series character Nurse Agnes Carmichael.

MAUREEN DALY at age 85, on September 25, 2006. Author of the best selling YA novel SEVENTEETHTH SUMMER, she edited two mystery anthologies. She was the widow of William P. McGivern.

WILLIAM DIEHL at age 81, on November 24, 2006. He was a best-selling crime novelist whose books SHARKY'S MACHINE and PRIMAL FEAR were filmed.

ERNEST DUDLEY at age 97, on February 1, 2006. He was a leading writer for British radio in the 1940s, creating the popular Mr. Morelle, a psychoanalyst-detective.

HENRY FARRELL at age 85, on March 29, 2006. He wrote seven novels, the most famous of which, *What Ever Happened to Baby Jane?* (1960), became a cult classic as a movie with Bette Davis and Joan Crawford.

KATE FLEMING, at age 41, in December 2006. A producer of audio books, she recorded over 200 of these as "Anna Fields" and won many awards for her work. Among the mystery authors whose work she narrated were Kate Wilhelm and Donna Leon.

COLIN FORBES at age 83, on August 23, 2006. The British author of such successful thrillers as AVA-LANCHE EXPRESS (1977) also wrote crime novels under his own name, Raymond Harold Dawkins, and as "Jay Bernard" and "Richard Raine."

GLENN FORD at age 90, on August 30, 2006. Long a Hollywood leading man, he played in many crime films including *The Big Heat* (1953) and *Experiment in Terror* (1962), in which he played the Gordons' series character, FBI agent John Ripley.

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ANTHONY FRANCIOSA at age 77, on January 19, 2006. He played Donald Hamilton's Matt Helm in a 1975 TV series.

MICHAEL GILBERT at age 93, on February 8, 2006. He was one of the best and most prolific of British mystery writers, creator of several series characters including Inspector Patrick Petrella. He was also an attorney, whose clients included Raymond Chandler.

JOHN GODEY at age 93, on April 16, 2006. Of his many novels the best known was THE TAKING OF PEL-HAM ONE TWO THREE (1973), which became a successful movie.

PATRICIA GUIVER at age 76, on June 13, 2006. A longtime animal welfare advocate, she used her love of animals in a series of books about a detective whose specialty is locating pets.

JOSEPH HAYES at age 88, on September 11, 2006. He wrote the novel THE DESPERATE HOURS (1954), which he later converted into a Tony-Award winning play. It was also filmed twice.

PHYLLIS KIRK at age 79, on October 19, 2006. She played in the most popular 3-D movie, House of Wax (1953), and was Nora Charles on the TV series The Thin Man (1957-1959).

CHARLES LARSON at age c.84, on September 21, 2006. The novelist and TV writer wrote a series about Nils-Frederik Blixen, beginning with SOMEONE'S DEATH (1973).

JAMES McCLURE at age 66, on June 17, 2006. A South African who went to England to escape apartheid, he is known for his series about Afrikaner Lt. Tromp Kramer and Bantu Sgt. Mickey Zondi. The first in the series, THE STEAM PIG (1971), won CWA's Gold Dagger.

DARREN McGAVIN at age 83, on February 25, 2006. Among his TV roles were George Harmon Coxe's "Flash" Casey and Mickey Spillane's Mike Hammer.

ELISABETH OGILVIE at age 89, on September 9, 2006. She was the author of 48 books, mostly about Maine, including seven crime novels.

FRANK ORENSTEIN at age 86, on March 19, 2006. His novels featuring Ev Franklin included several, such as MURDER ON MADISON AVE (1983), about the advertising industry.

MARY ORR at age 95, on September 22, 2006. Her short story "The Wisdom of Eve" was the basis for the film All About Eve. With her husband Reginald Denham, she wrote crime plays. She was also an actress and appeared on Broadway in The Desperate Hours.

JACK PALANCE at age 87, on November 10, 2006. Famous for his one-arm pushups when he won an Oscar, he was the villain in many films, notably Sudden Fear (1952) and Shane (1953).

ARTHUR PORGES at age 90, on May 12, 2006. In addition to science fiction and detective short stories, he wrote parodies of Sherlock Holmes and Ellery Queen.

RINEHART S. POTTS at age 79, on September 18, 2006. He was the leading expert on the work of Elizabeth Linington and for 20 years edited and published The Linington Lineup.

LORD PETER RAWLINSON at age 87, on June 28, 2006. Once Solicitor General and, later, Attorney General of England, he turned to writing legal thrillers after retirement.

ROBERT ROSENBERG at age 54, on October 25, 2006. He was a reporter based in Jerusalem who created a series about detective Avram Cohen of that city.

MICKEY SPILLANE at age 88, on July 17, 2006. He was the creator of private eye Mike Hammer, whose success in paperback reprints is said to have been responsible for publishers turning to paperback original novels. At one time Spillane's sales made him the best selling author in the world.

JOSEPH STEFANO at age 84, on August 25, 2006. He wrote scripts for television and movies and is best known for his screenplay for Hitchcock's *Psycho* (1960).

FRANK ("FRANKIE") THOMAS at age 85, on May 11, 2006. An actor who played Nancy Drew's boy friend on film, he wrote Sherlockian pastiche novels after leaving acting.

WILSON "BOB" TUCKER at age 91, on October 6, 2006. In addition to being a leading science fiction writer, he wrote five detective novels about Charles Horne. His habit of including real people as fictional characters in his books led to what is now known as "Tuckerization."

DOROTHY UHNAK at age 76, on July 8, 2006. A former NYC transit police officer, she used her experience in writing non-fiction and, later, a series of novels beginning with THE BAIT (1968), co-winner of an Edgar for Best First Novel.

MARILYN WALLACE at age 65, on July 29, 2006. In addition to writing novels, she edited the popular series of Sisters in Crime anthologies and Deadly Partners, a collaboration of Private Eye Writers of America and Sisters in Crime.

DENNIS WEAVER at age 81, on February 24, 2006. After playing the deputy Chester in *Gunsmoke*, he had the lead in *McCloud* (1970-1976) as a New Mexico lawman in New York City.

JACK WILLIAMSON at age 98, in November 2006. A leading science fiction writer, he also wrote mysteries, including MAZEWAY (1990), which is set in the future.

LCC BYLAWS

The "Left Coast Crime Convention," the "Western Regional Mystery Conference" hereto referred to as "LCC," is an event sponsored by fans of Mystery Literature, for fans of Mystery Literature. LCC is an annual convention. The intent is to provide an event where fans of the Mystery genre can gather in convivial surroundings to pursue their interests in the genre.

LCC is a non-profit enterprise which must be incorporated locally by each LCC volunteer-based committee for the duration of the event. Sponsorship by existing non-profit organizations is encouraged as long as they adhere to LCC bylaws.

Past, present and future LCC are not responsible for the debts incurred by any previous or subsequent LCC events.

LCC will feature a Guest(s) of Honor (GoH), who is to be treated as a literary treasure. All expenses within reason incurred by the GoH will be the responsibility of that year's LCC. In the event that LCC has more than one GoH, at least one GoH must reside or have novels set in the Western Region. Fan Guest(s) of Honor are to be treated in the same manner as author GoHs.

Any LCC may create any new guest designation other than Lifetime Achievement.

LCC will do its best to extend hospitality to its entire membership.

A standing committee shall be established to:

- Register and maintain the name Left Coast Crime and the Western Regional Mystery Conference with continuing trademark protection.
- Maintain the LCC mailing list.
- Maintain the continuity of LCC.
- To review and oversee the site selection for future LCC.
- To select the site for upcoming LCC conferences, based on bids from viable bidding committees.
- To act as executive committee to represent the membership should an emergency arise.
- To remove accreditation from any site committee that imperils the viability of future LCC. This includes failure to secure a venue one year in advance, violation of LCC bylaws or the appearance that the committee will be unable to properly stage the event.
- To review the financial report prepared by each LCC committee.

LCC is the "Western North American Regional Mystery Conference" as defined by the Mountain Time Zone and all time zones westward to Hawaii. The LCC rotates north to south on an annual basis. Conventions held in the Northern Region are held in even-numbered years, Southern Region in odd-numbered years.

Regions defined as follows:

Northern Region

Canada: British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan, Yukon

United States: Alaska, Washington, Idaho, Montana, Oregon, Wyoming, Utah, Colorado, California (north of Santa Clara County), Nevada (north of Las Vegas)

Southern Region

United States: New Mexico, Arizona, Texas (El Paso only), Hawaii, Nevada (south of Lake Tahoe), California (Santa Clara county and southward), Mexico

LCC will held in the first quarter of the calendar year.

LCC will not be held for more than two consecutive years in the same region if at all possible.

Bidding For Future LCCs

Bids for future LCC must be submitted to the standing committee no later than 45 days prior to the commencement of the current year's LCC. Bidding committees must:

- Submit a resume of its committee members with its bid
- Submit a site for the event
- Submit a letter of intent from event site

Bids for future LCC maybe accepted up to 3 years in advance.

If no bid is received, the standing committee may solicit bids.

The awarding of LCC locations to a bidding committee shall be made by majority vote of the standing committee.

In case of a tie vote in the standing committee, the bids will be put to a vote of the general membership at the current LCC.

"None of the Above" will be an option placed on any such ballot. If "None of the Above" wins, all competing bids are excluded from consideration. The standing committee will solicit alternative bids, and from those choose the one they feel most qualified.

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The current LCC committee will provide the LCC in the immediate year following the minimum by way of support:

- One page of advertising in program book
- A space to sell memberships at current event
- One free attending membership to current event

.

Extending this support to other future LCC concoms would be commendable but is not mandatory.

Name Badges

It is the intention of LCC to be an egalitarian gathering of mystery fans that does not create a distinction between fans of the mystery genre professional and otherwise. Therefore:

- Names printed on badges should be readable at 5 feet.
- The only designations allowed on badges are Dealer, Exhibitor, Staff/Committee and Program Participant. (This is done for security reasons only.)
- Ribbons or other items that differentiate participants are prohibited.

Dealers and Exhibitors

A space (bookroom) must be made available for the sale and display of goods of interest (books) to the membership of LCC.

Acceptance to the book room is based on seniority.

Acceptance of other dealers is at the discretion of current committee after obligations to Legacy Dealers have been taken care of. (A Legacy Dealer is someone who has done 7 of the last 10 LCCs.)

Hours: The dealers' room will open to the membership no earlier than 9 AM local time. The room will be open a minimum of twenty hours over the course of the event.

A dealers' room contains more than one bookseller or exhibitor.

Each exhibition space will include a membership to the event.

LCC must receive a hold harmless agreement from exhibitor in order to participate in LCC.

Tables for non-profit literary fan groups should be provided free of charge, if possible.

Awards

The Lefty, an award for the best humorous mystery, is to be awarded at each Left Coast Crime. Books eligible for the award must have been published for the first time in the United States in the calendar year preceding the convention. Books which appeared in other countries in earlier years are still eligible as long as they meet the American publication requirement. Nominations are to be solicited from registered members of the convention beginning on Jan. 1 of the year in which the convention is held. The short list shall consist of the five books receiving the most nominations. All registered members of the convention are eligible to vote. Final balloting and tabulation shall be conducted at Left Coast Crime with the winner announced during the convention, preferably at the banquet. The physical properties of the award are left to the discretion of the each host Left Coast Crime committee. Furthermore, up to three other awards may be awarded at the discretion of individual Left Coast Crime conventions in categories to be chosen by the current organizing committee. Subsequent committees may but are not required to continue any of these awards.

Membership on the Standing Committee shall include:

The immediate past year's chair, the current chair and accredited future chairs.

To maintain the continuity of LCC, the Standing Committee will contain a maximum of 5 permanent committee whose qualifications are:

- Having attended a minimum of 5 non-profit mystery conventions, of which at least 3 must be LCC;
- Worked on at least 3 previous non-profit literary events, and in a committee position on at least two of those events.

Permanent Membership on the standing committee is for the lifetime of LCC or until formal resignation.

It is the responsibility of the Permanent Standing Committee to deal with site selection of future LCCs.

The permanent members of the standing committee are the court of last resort in disputes arising from site selection.

The permanent committee members are the living memory of LCC. They provide a resource and recourse for future LCC committee. (The wheel need not be reinvented.)

Member at large:

Any person with interest in LCC may submit their name for consideration for membership on the standing committee to the standing committee. If accepted by standing committee, the term is for 2 years.

The standing committee will approve new members by a majority vote.

The member(s) of at large will be full voting members of the standing committee.
