

# Welcome to Crime on the Comstock!



# Guest of Honor: Naomi Hirahara by Dianne Emley

Among the myriad stereotypes about Los Angeles, which it is adept at spawning, is that no one is *from* here. So when two among the many native Angelenos meet, especially if they came of age in the same off-theradar pocket within the megalopolis — the foothill communities of the San Gabriel Valley — there's an immediate connection, like an exchange of a secret handshake. That's how I felt the first time I met Naomi Hirahara at a meeting of the Southern California Mystery Writers of America Board of Directors, to which we had both been elected in 2007.

Naomi had recently won the Edgar Award for *Snakeskin Shamisen*, the third book in her acclaimed, bestselling series featuring her unlikely sleuth Mas Arai, an atomic bomb survivor who's now an aging, cur-

mudgeonly gardener in Altadena, CA, a character inspired by Naomi's father. At the time, Naomi and I were both living in Pasadena frequently and carpooled to writer events. Truth: People don't walk (much) in L.A. While navigating traffic (that L.A. nightmare is accurate), Naomi and I got to know each other. Something you should know about Naomi, if you don't already, is that she's a nice person. That's not an adjective that I bestow lightly. She's truly kind, bighearted, and interested in people. She's a stand-

up person, true to her word, and open minded. And she has a wickedly quick sense of humor. I'm delighted that over the years we've become friends.

The greater L.A. area is home to a long established Japanese-American community with a large population in L.A.'s eastside, where I grew up. Many of my grade school friends were Nisei, meaning American-born of Japanese immigrants. Most of their parents had been sent to detention camps during WWII. Like Naomi, on Saturdays my Nisei friends were unavailable for fun because they were attending Japanese school in Downtown L.A.'s Little Tokyo. Through my friends, I'd come to learn about and love California's Japanese American culture. Naomi is passionate about researching, documenting, and supporting this rich and underrepresented aspect of California history.

In college, Naomi expanded on her interests in Japanese and other cultures, majoring in International Relations at Stanford, spending a summer volunteering in Ghana, and studying Japanese language in Tokyo. Returning to L.A. and her roots, she did a stint as the editor of the *Rafu Shimpo*, a Japanese-language newspaper, which my best friend's father read after he returned in the evening from his job in the produce department of a local supermarket. Naomi eventually began writing books, nonfiction at first, with topics that delved into aspects of local Japanese-American culture

such as Japanese-American gardeners in Southern California and notable Californian Japanese Americans.

Then Naomi tackled her first novel, Summer of the Big Bachi, introducing Mas Arai to the world. The world loved him. In addition to winning an Edgar, the series has racked up nominations for the Macavity and the Anthony awards, and earned such honors as the Chicago Tribune's Ten Best Mysteries and Thrillers and Publishers Weekly Best Book of the Year. Naomi has concluded the sevenbook series with Hiroshima *Boy*, which has just been released bv Prospect Park Books.

Never content to rest on her laurels, Naomi embarked on


new challenges, pushing her own boundaries. Seeking to craft a younger and more contemporary protagonist, Naomi wrote *Murder on Bamboo Lane* and *Grave on Grand Avenue*, which feature young, urban, Asian-American LAPD bicycle cop Ellie Rush. Naomi also penned a middle grade novel, *1001 Cranes*, a story about how learning to fold traditional origami paper cranes helps a Japanese-American girl go through a difficult period in her life. I had the pleasure of sharing a book fair table with Naomi and watching her guide the children who stopped by in making simple origami figures. They loved it and it was clear that Naomi did

too. She says she'd like to write another children's book and I hope she does.

With Mas Arai's saga concluded, Naomi is busy reinventing herself yet again, tackling an astounding variety of projects and new skills. Her courage and vigor amaze me. Can she bottle it, please? How about taking on improv comedy? Yep. Developing *Summer of the Big Bachi* into an independent film? Can't wait to see it. Starting a new series about Japanese Americans in Chicago after WWII? Heck yeah! All while she finds time to support civic and cultural events and show up at friends' book launches. Like one of her book titles, she *is* a *gasa-gasa* girl. Who knows where her talent and inspiration will take her next? We're eager to hang on for the ride.





# The Extraordinary Grace of William Kent Krueger by Lori Rader-Day

I first met William Kent Krueger as his stalker. Not quite like that.

This was about eight or nine years ago. I had just learned that the book I was writing, my first attempt at a novel, might be crime fiction. I had not planned for this. I was years deep into a master of fine arts degree, and,

as far as I knew, no one there was writing crime novels. But I had also just earned a spot in a writing workshop that covered a lot of different kinds of writing — and William Kent Krueger, mystery writer, would be teaching there.

At the workshop, I followed him from room to room. All weekend. Wherever this Krueger guy dropped knowledge, there I was, scraping it up.

Luckily I didn't stand out as a COMPLETE PSYCHO, because in fact many people followed Kent Krueger from room to room at that conference and, let's be honest, at this one. And probably in any situation where he might drop a pearl of wisdom. He's just

that likeable, and he has just that amount of wisdom to share. And the thing is? He does. He shares it.

Since I stalked — ahem, met Kent Krueger, I've had a lot of opportunities to listen to him talk, publicly and casually, at conferences and workshops, during bookstore visits, and in the off hours of Left Coast Crime and other events, when it's time for a glass of wine with Diane. I've also had the chance to talk with Kent as a peer these last few years, and as his Mystery Writers of America chapter president for a while there. What stands out about Kent in every interaction is that he is generous, genuine, and always exactly as you hoped he'd be, if you met him first through his writing.

And what writing it is.

I hardly need to tell you because, chances are, you already know: William Kent Krueger is one of our moment's best writers, one of our genre's real artists. His generosity of spirit trickles over into his characters, where each gets the full effect of his powers, where each story is thrilling and touching in equal parts. Kent Krueger's books are enthralling, sublime in the way of an awe-inspiring landscape painting, like the best of the Hudson River School (Google it), only crafted in words: mountains and waterfalls heavily featured, a storm brewing on the horizon, and, in the foreground, a tiny human figure down in the corner, jaw dropped.

Isn't that how you felt when you met Cork O'Connor and the Up North Minnesota settings of his adventures? Maybe it was in the Anthony and Barry award-winning

> debut Iron Lake (1998) or in one of the other 15 Cork titles since then. The 17th in the series. Desolation Mountain, is out from Atria in August. When you visited Purgatory Ridge, Blood Hollow, Vermillion Drift - Kent would make a pretty good travel agent, wouldn't he? He sells these locations - you really went there. You felt the cold, smelled the wood smoke and the forests. Did you close the book to find to your surprise that you were not in the Boundary Waters at all but still sitting on your own lumpy couch?

We got comfortable on that couch, letting Cork orient us in the woods. Until Kent Krueger published his (so far) masterpiece, Ordinary Grace (2013). Ordinary Grace launched to the New York Times bestseller list and won every award it was nominated for, which was most of them: Edgar Award for Best Novel, Midwest Booksellers Choice Award for Best Fiction, Goodreads Choice Awards for Best Mystery & Thriller, the Dilys Award from the Independent Mystery Booksellers Association, Left Coast Crime Award for Best Mystery Set Within the United States, Barry Award for Best Novel, Macavity Award for Best Novel, and Anthony Award for Best Novel. The Huffington Post said it was a book "once in a blue moon." The reviewers loved it. The booksellers loved it. And then the readers loved it. Love it, present tense. There's a quality of passion in the initiated. Kent Krueger wrote a book that has fervent believers. The ardent admiration some readers reserve for Ordinary Grace is what every writer hopes for, that our books will find the readers who will be most touched, even changed, by what we write. As readers, we only hope the writers we love are somewhere writing more.




Meanwhile, how it's done is... ordinary. Krueger is up at the crack of dawn at a coffee shop down the street, writing the next book. This morning. Tomorrow. The day after that. Doesn't matter if it's Left Coast Crime this week. (It will be something else next week.) He's got a regular seat somewhere in this hotel where he can get coffee and his word count done, first thing. The Church of Ordinary Grace has not changed one thing about Kent Krueger in this respect: He is a craftsman of words in the sense that doing the work is what matters, and the only way to get the work done is to come at it with the discipline of a woodworker, with the devotion of an acolyte. To work at the page as though it's an ordinary thing, until the words start to rise from the paper, stand on their own, expand their lungs, and breathe. Until the words form the mountain, the waterfall, the storm on the horizon, and the small human form witnessing, wrestling it all. Until the sublime is captured, corked. And then — William Kent Krueger does what he is known to do. He shares it.

# Toastmaster: Todd Borg by Lynn Bremer



The air up there in the clouds is very pure and fine, bracing and delicious. And why shouldn't it be? — it is the same the angels breathe.

(Mark Twain, writing about Lake Tahoe, Roughing It.)

Todd grew up in Minnesota reading the mysteries of the Hardy Boys and Nancy Drew and writing four mysteries of his own, which he says remain locked in his desk drawer. At the University of Minnesota, he was headed for medical school, but sometime in those four years he had an epiphany, when he realized that doctors had to be in hospitals, and he hated hospitals. He loved skiing and got a job in the skiing business. Oh, yes, and tried his hand as a singer/songwriter. In 1990, Todd and his artist wife Kit moved from Minnesota to Lake Tahoe in pursuit of the skiing life. During the nonskiing season, Todd continued reading mysteries, especially the triumvirate of male detectives, Dashiell Hammett, Raymond Chandler, and Ross Macdonald, notable for strong stories and characters. Add to the list, John D. Macdonald and Robert Parker, and Todd thought Tahoe would be the perfect place to set his own detective stories.

Todd's characters are transplants as well. In the first of the series, *Tahoe Deathfall*, Owen McKenna is an ex-San Francisco Homicide Detective, a loner and a hiker, who opens an investigation business after giving it all up (revealed in *Tahoe Blowup*) to live in a cabin on the Nevada side of the lake with a view of the California side, along with his Harlequin Great Dane, Spot. Street Casey is Owen's forensic entomologist girlfriend, who got her name from her mother not getting to the hospital on time. Street helps occasionally on cases when she studies the insects on the dead bodies to determine the time of death and other pertinent information. Owen's good friend is Sgt. If you are at the south shore of Lake Tahoe looking for a breakfast place, The Red Hut at Ski Run has a terrific Owen's Omelette!

After Reno won the bid for LCC 2018, the hunt was on for Nevada mystery writers. Thanks to Sundance Books, Todd gives a talk in Reno whenever he has a new book coming out, and I am a regular reader of his series. After one of his presentations, I had an excuse to tell him about LCC. Todd was my only choice for Toastmaster. He's a terrific ambassador for Lake Tahoe and Nevada writers, with that gift for stories and gab that we Nevadans enjoy!

"I am a lucky guy," he says, in excitement about being the 2018 Toastmaster, and is honored to be in the company of previous Left Coast Crime toastmasters.



The Candy Dance began in 1919, for the purchase and maintenance of street lighting. One of the best kept secrets about Nevada is that we have lots of fun history!

turned his talents to the mystery tale, usually with his tongue firmly in his cheek.

The best-known of Twain's mysteries, *Pudd'nhead Wilson*, is also a scathing treatise on small-town society and politics, slavery, and racism. Published in 1894, though set in the antebellum era, the novel contains perhaps the first fictional description of fingerprints being used as a means of identification. The book's title character is a young lawyer named David Wilson, who on his first day in the town of Dawson's Landing, Missouri, makes a joke that is so completely misunderstood by the locals it earns him the name "Pudd'nhead." Wilson's hobby of collecting and cataloguing the fingerprints of everyone in town on small pieces of glass further cements his reputation as a charming but eccentric dolt.

Years later one of the town's most respectable citizens, Judge Driscoll, is stabbed to death with an ornate dagger belonging to a visiting Italian nobleman named Luigi Capello, who is arrested. Wilson finally gets to prove he is no dolt by acting as counsel for the defense. Through comparing the fingerprints in his collection with the prints left in blood on the dagger, Wilson proves that the killer is not Capello. It is instead the judge's wastrel nephew Tom, who desperately needed his uncle's money to pay gambling debts.

Then Wilson shockingly reveals that Tom is not really a Driscoll at all. He is the natural son of a very light-skinned former slave named Roxy, who had switched him with the real Tom, whom she was nursing, when they were babies. She did so in order to ensure that her son would never face being sold down the river to a brutal Southern plantation owner. In a final ironic twist that is chillingly grim even for Twain, that is precisely the fate of the false Tom.

At the time of *Pudd'nhead Wilson's* publication, the practice of using fingerprinting for identification was brand new, and in use only in Argentina. The notion

# **Ghost of Honor: Mark Twain** The Crimes of Mark Twain, by Michael Mallory

As a man of letters, Samuel L. Clemens, better known as Mark Twain, needs no introduction. As a crime writer, however, he might. While Twain commonly reserved his "pen warmed up in Hell" to skewer the social mores of the day, on occasion he

to a courtroom setting in the novella *Tom Sawyer*, *Detective* (1896). Once again the plot involved lookalikes, though this time they were identical twins, Jake and Jubiter Dunlap. Tom Sawyer and his best friend (and in this instance, his Watson) Huckleberry Finn are dispatched by Tom's aunt to travel to Arkansas to run interference between Tom's Uncle Silas and the Dunlap family, who are at odds. En route they encounter a mysterious, solitary figure who turns out to be Jake Dunlap, who vanished seven years earlier and was presumed dead. Jake reveals to Tom that he and two others stole a cache of valuable diamonds in St. Louis, and that he is now on the run from his former cohorts.

After the three arrive in town, Jake's twin Jubiter is discovered dead, his body hidden, and Silas is not only blamed for the crime, he confesses to it! But Tom Sawyer figures otherwise. "Why, I had eyes and could see things, but they never meant nothing to me," Huck Finn tells the reader. "When Tom Sawyer seen a thing it just got up on its hind legs and talked to him — told him everything it knowed!"

An Arkansas law (seasoned with a heavy dose of salt) permits teenaged Tom Sawyer to act as his uncle's trial attorney. He reveals that while Silas had bonked Jubiter on the head, he had not killed him. How does he know this? Because Jubiter was still alive, and posing as Jake, truth deduced by Tom upon seeing a signature mannerism that Jubiter habitually displayed, which Jake did not. Jake Dunlap, therefore, was the dead man, having been killed by his two fellow jewel thieves.

In addition to recasting Tom and Huck (who repeatedly calls the opposing counsel "the lawyer for the prostitution") as Holmes and Watson, Twain also drew details from a 17th-century true crime case in Denmark, which had been turned into the 1829 Danish novel *The Rector of Veilbye*, by Steen Steenson Blitcher.

But if Tom Sawyer as Sherlock Holmes wasn't enough, Twain's novelette *A Double-Barreled Detective Story* (1902) included the real thing — though Sherlockians would consider this version of the Great Detective non-canonical in the extreme. In fact, Twain's satirical conceit is that Holmes' hilariously convoluted deductions are always wrong.



The wild-and-wooly plot of *A Double-Barreled Detective Story* begins with a pregnant young woman being brutalized by her betrothed, one Jacob Fuller, who has set his bloodhounds on her. Fuller disappears and the woman gives birth to a boy named Archy, who is something of a human bloodhound, complete with night vision and an enhanced sense of smell. When the boy is old enough, his mother sends him on a mission to find Fuller.

Archy tracks who he thinks is Fuller to a Western mining town, whose residents also include a disagreeable man named Flint Buckner, and an English indentured servant named Fetlock Jones, who is Sherlock Holmes' nephew. Before long, Holmes himself shows up, having finally caught up with a gold miner and presumed career criminal named James Walker after a long pursuit. When Flint Buckner is killed, Holmes offers a completely erroneous solution to the murder, leaving it up to Archy to sniff out the real killer. Furthermore, Holmes' wrongful hounding and harassment of James Walker, who is innocent of everything, incites the other residents to mob justice, and they attempt to burn the Great Detective at the stake! Fortunately, Holmes is saved at the last minute by the town constable.

A Double-Barreled Detective Story was first published in April of 1902, right as the last serialized chapter of *The Hound of the Baskervilles* was appearing in *The Strand Magazine*, meaning that some American readers — and perhaps even Twain himself — might not have been aware that Conan Doyle had brought Holmes back from his literary death. So Twain's tale might be taken as the first effort to explain what Holmes was up to during his "Great Hiatus," or it might simply be a skewering of the entire detective genre and its leading light.

An even more bizarre mystery can be found in the novelette A Murder, a Mystery, and a Marriage, which Twain wrote in 1876, but which did not see authorized publication until 2011. The murder in question concerned an incidence of bad blood between two families, and the marriage was the culmination of a love triangle between the murdered man's brother, the accused killer, and a phony French count. Family feuds and bad betrothals were recurring themes in Twain's works. The mystery, however, was a real pip: how could the count have suddenly appeared half-buried in a snow bank without there being any footprints in the snow, or any other indication as to how he got there? Twain's original intent was to provide the story's setup only, and then have other prominent writers contribute their own solutions. Unfortunately, no one took him up on it, and the project was shelved. Only Twain's solution survives



... and it's enough to make one wonder what he was really smoking in those cigars.

The "count" turned out to be a French commoner named Jean Mercier, the assistant to novelist Jules Verne. Having gotten sick and tired of Verne's sending him off on one dangerous adventure after another for research purposes, Mercier pushed Verne out of a hotair balloon, presumably to his death. (The real Verne was, of course, very much alive in 1876.) Later Mercier himself falls out of the gondola and lands in the snow, which is why there are no footprints.

Critics today theorize that Twain was burlesquing the huge popularity in America of works by the author he called "that French idiot." There is, however, another possible explanation. One of the American translators of Jules Verne's best-known books, including *Twenty Thousand Leagues Under the Sea*, in the 1870s was one Rev. Louis Page Mercier, who bylined himself "Mercier Lewis." Under any name, Mercier was an inept translator who frequently reduced Verne's prose and scientific details to nonsense. If Twain realized that, could the root of his joke be that Jules Verne was murdered in America by a guy named Mercier?

Mark Twain could hardly be considered a serious rival to such contemporaries as Arthur Conan Doyle or Melville Davisson Post in terms of Victorian-era detective fiction. But his dabbles within the genre are nothing if not outrageous, whimsical, and sometimes barbed, though a lot of fun. They also confirm that Twain was a social and literary critic who considered no contemporary sacred.




#### Nevada Territory, The Birthplace of "Mark Twain"

Samuel Clemens lived in Nevada from 1861 to 1864, and visited the area twice after leaving. He engaged in prospecting on the Comstock Lode with dreams of striking it rich. He failed.


Clemens first used his famous pen name on February 3, 1863, when he wrote a humorous travel account to the Virginia City news-paper, the *Territorial Enterprise*.

Among the lessons he learned in Nevada was "how far he could push a joke," due to some "disagreeable experiences" he brought on himself. Thanks to his time in Nevada, Twain was able to enter easily into the Bohemian literary society of San Francisco in 1864, and "required no apology.... His work as a writer on the *Territorial Enterprise* had given him wide notoriety, and in previous visits to San Francisco he had been treated as a celebrity."








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# "G" Is for Grafton by Janet Rudolph

Sue Grafton, a trailblazer writer of the female P.I., passed away on December 28, 2017, at the age of 77. Sue was a gracious and talented woman with a wry sense of humor and a huge amount of Southern charm. She was supportive of other writers and a friend to all. Her books had terrific plots and great characters, including, of course, Kinsey Milhone. Her novels entertained us, filled with a unique zeitgeist and lessons on life.

Sue Grafton was one of my heroes... one of those people you admire, respect, and emulate. I've read all of her books — from *A Is for Alibi* to *Y Is for Yesterday*. In 1986, when she published *C Is for Corpse*, I invited her to speak at our fledgling Mystery Readers Literary Salon. Not surprisingly, she was a huge hit. At the 1990 Bouchercon in London, she replaced the "little black dress" with a black beaded jacket and pants, just as versatile. I don't remember Kinsey wearing that in the books, but it was perfect! I emulated Sue's fashion prowess! Understated but elegant.

I got to spend time with Sue in 2011 at Malice Domestic where we shared top billing... well, as if. I received the Poirot Award, and she, the Lifetime Achievement Award, so we were thrown together at various functions and talks. I mention this because we both received Malice teapots that we shipped back to our respective homes. Several weeks later, I noticed my teapot read "Sue Grafton: Lifetime Achievement." After perfect guest, available to all. What an enjoyable time for her fans and friends!

Sue was also very supportive of new and veteran writers. I ran into her at several conventions, and I was always amazed when I saw her sitting alone in panel sessions, taking notes. She never stopped learning or sharing her knowledge with anyone in the mystery community and beyond.

Sadly, there will be no Z Is for Zero. The Alphabet ends with Y.

As to Sue's writing, she was clever in establishing a character, appealing to so many, who aged only seven years in the 25 novels. No need for new forensics. Her mysteries have been published in 28 countries and 26 languages — including Estonian, Bulgarian, and Indonesian. Books in her Kinsey Milhone Alphabet series, beginning with *A Is for Alibi* in 1982 and ending last year with *Y Is for Yesterday*, are international bestsellers with readership in the millions.

Named a Grand Master by the Mystery Writers of America, Sue received many other honors and awards, including the Lifetime Achievement Award from the Private Eye Writers of America, the Ross Macdonald Literary Award, the Cartier Diamond Dagger Award from Britain's Crime Writers' Association, the Lifetime Achievement Award from Malice Domestic, the Lifetime Achievement Award from our own Left Coast Crime, the Anthony Award given by Bouchercon, the

remember "The Jerk" and the stories she told about him at conferences and talks in those early days.

Long fascinated by mysteries that had related titles. including those by John D. MacDonald, whose titles referenced colors, and Harry Kemelman, who used days of the week, and then Edward Gorey's The Gashlycrumb Tinies, an alphabetical picture book of children who die by various means, she got the idea to write a series of novels based on the alphabet. She immediately sat down and made a list of all of the crime-related words that she knew. This exercise led to her chronological series of Kinsey Milhone, P.I. mystery novels. Known as "the alphabet novels," the stories are set in and around the fictional town of Santa Teresa, California. Santa Teresa is based on Santa Barbara, outside of which Grafton lived in the suburb of Montecito, Grafton also chose to use the name Santa Teresa as a tribute to the author Ross Macdonald, who

had used it as a fictional name for Santa Barbara in his own novels.

In 1992, Sue told the *Chicago Tribune* that she wanted to be the "king of American mysteries" — "Not the queen, please. I want to be the king." OK, then. All Hail, the King!

Sue was scheduled to be the Lifetime Achievement Honoree at the next Left Coast Crime convention in Vancouver, British Columbia, in March 2019. She will remain "G Is for Guest" in our hearts. Perhaps the best tribute we can do to honor Sue Grafton is to read or reread all of her mysteries, starting with "A...." Thanks, Sue, for leaving such a wonderful legacy.





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

## Left Coast Crime Awards — The Lefty

Since 2016, all Left Coast Crime Awards are designated as "Lefty" Awards. Once upon a time, the "Lefty"— first awarded in 1996 — was the award given for the best humorous mystery. The LCC Bylaws now provide that each annual convention will give Lefty Awards for best novel in four categories: Humorous, Historical (the Bruce Alexander Memorial, first given in 2004), Debut, and Best (not in the other categories). Annual conventions no longer pick optional award categories.

Over the years, optional awards have been given in a variety of categories, such as for the best mystery set in the LCC geographical region (Mountain & Pacific time zones in North America and west to Hawaii), and variously named depending on the convention location: e.g., *Otter* (Monterey 2004), *Calavera* (El Paso 2005), *Rocky* (Denver 2008 & Colorado Springs 2013), and *Rose* (Portland 2015). Other varieties of geographically-based award include the *Hillerman Sky* for Southwest settings (Santa Fe 2011), *Golden Nugget* for California (Sacramento 2012), and the *Squid* (US) and *Calamari* (non-US) (Monterey 2014).

Awards for best first mystery include the *Eureka!* (Sacramento 2012) and *Rosebud* (Portland 2015). And let's not forget the *Watson*, for the mystery with the best sidekick (Santa Fe 2011 & Colorado Springs 2013), and the *Hawaii Five-O* (2009) for law enforcement and police procedurals. 

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
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## Who Benefits? The LCC 2018 Charity


Each Left Coast Crime Convention raises money to support a local literacy organization with funds raised through silent and live auctions, along with the annual Quilt Raffle. LCC 2018's auction recipient is the Women and Children's Center of the Sierra (WACCS), a nonprofit 501(c)(3) organization that provides education, job training, resources, and referrals to help women escape or avoid poverty in order to provide a better life for their families.

WACCS offers a comprehensive variety of services to underresourced women and their children. Core programs include classes for high school equivalency preparation, English as a Second Language, and computer skills training; Gateway to Success job preparation and attainment program; GS2 for women seeking to advance in their jobs and lives; a diaper bank; and case management for women needing to regain financial stability. All services are free and focus on the special barriers faced by poor women living day-to-day, crisis-to-crisis.



All proceeds from the Left Coast Crime 2018 auction go to WACSS.

LCC attendees have donated items for the silent auction and they are all on display in Nugget Ballroom 2, which is also the Book Room, open Thursday, 9:00 AM – 5:00 PM, Friday 9:00 AM – 6:30 PM, Saturday, 9:00 AM – 5:00 PM. Final bidding takes place on Saturday from 6:00 PM until the beginning of the Lefty Award Banquet at 7:00 PM. The winners will be posted outside the Nugget Ballroom, and items can be redeemed after the Banquet and on Sunday morning between 9:00 AM – 1:00 PM.

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
